Estuary Arts Centre is honoured to have been selected to showcase the Japanese travelling Exhibition, "The Spirit of Budo"

The Exhibition consists of two parts:

The first part includes a selection of reproductions and originals of historical weapons such as bow and arrows, suits of armour and helmets are on display and the development and changes of Japanese martial arts from 8th Century to 19th Century are explained. Many of the ancient types of armour and weapons have not survived to present day or are too fragile to transport, that is why reproductions have been included in the display.

The second part deals with the reorganisation of bujutsu to Budo in the 19th and 20th centuries and how the spirit of martial arts is still inherent in the daily life of Japanese people. Nine Budō associations are also introduced and the clothes and implements such as bamboo swords, protectors, bows and arrows which are used by players and students in present day can also be seen.

"We hope that through this exhibition the viewers will become aware of not only the history of Japanese martial arts, but also of people's aesthetic awareness and creativity, and Japan's social history and the Japanese way of thinking from a new angle."

"I am a product of Estuary Arts painting lessons, taking my first painting lessons three years ago at the age of 68. Since then I have immersed myself into abstract art exploring different genres. Lately I have begun to define my own style working with bold colours, forms and occasional texture. Elementary forms and forces seem to be driving my work, nourished by rich colours and bold structure. I am starting to understand that less can be more, but often simple shapes (less) loaded and rich colour (more) can make a bold statement. Painting follows a lifetime interest in modern art. A busy corporate life in Australia often took me to New York, Los Angeles and London where I would always take time out to visit (sneak away) to the great modern art galleries, especially the New York Museum of Modern Art. Standing in front of the works of the great modern painters like Pollock, Rothco, Frankethaler and Miro, I always had a strong emotional reaction to these works, and the all influence what I am trying to attempt on my canvases today.
