

Chair's Report - Stephen Lyttelton

As an observer, I attended last month's Hibiscus and Bays Local Board meeting, held at the Council's offices in Orewa. My timing was most opportune, for I was both pleased and proud to hear Board Chair, Julia Parfitt, speak enthusiastically about our progress in terms of the quality of our new strategic plan, our vision, the plan's implementation and the excellent level of our community engagement.

For historical reasons, it is clear to me that our Centre is not receiving its fair share of the arts funding from Council. As well, we currently rely on annual grants with no long term funding streams in place. This is a most unsatisfactory state of affairs and it inhibits successful long term planning for our Centre.

With our population catchment area being one of the fastest growing areas in the Auckland Region, this funding inequality needs to be addressed to ensure that we receive a comparable growing slice of the Council arts funding pie and so we can ensure that our offering meets the creative needs of our growing community.

Our Board of Trustees is currently working on strategies to address these issues. Our Board has decided to adopt a proactive approach to ensure we are in the driving seat and the catalyst for positive change in the planning for the future expansion of the Centre's facilities. Expanded facilities will cater for this population growth and allow us to deepen and widen our Centre's creative arts offering and provide more diverse programmes and exhibitions. A great opportunity for local artists to get behind is the "Great Up-cycling challenge" which will be the major fundraiser for EACT this year in November.

More information on what we have planned in these strategically important areas will be outlined to you at our September AGM.


