G1: "Boats and Birds" Sculpture by Michael Irwin

Michael has always had a love of boats and birds from his earliest memories. He loves the form and shape of both and how they can dip and soar through their respective environments. The stone used in the sculptures are Taranaki Andesite (hard and grey) and Oamaru stone (white).



G1: "Method in My Madness" paintings by Carolyn Annand Opening Thursday 26 Sept 6pm to 7.30pm

G4: "A Coastal Garden" Painting by Catherine Mitchell

Chair's Report - Stephen Lyttelton

SPECIAL REPORT ON THE 2019 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The AGM was held at Estuary Arts on Friday 20 September 2019, at 7 p.m.

Despite the first game of the Rugby World Cup being on TV, we had a satisfactory level of attendance. We were privileged to have attending Julia Parfitt, Chair of the Hibiscus & Bays Local Board and her Deputy, Janet Fitzgerald.

I introduced the Trustees who were present at the AGM and explained that all our Trustees had a passion for arts and culture on the Coast. I outlined the specialist skills and experience our Trustees bought to the Estuary Arts' Board table. I explained that their work for Estuary Arts was undertaken entirely on a voluntary basis and a round of applause was given for their efforts.

I outlined three key matters of interest to the Estuary Arts community:

Our successes over the past year

These included the refurbishment of our Weka Gift shop. This has been an outstanding success for us. We now have a much more captivating entrance and a stronger retail presence for our visitors. Financially, we have seen a good uplift in shop sales following the refurbishment. This past year, we have improved the accessibility of our art programmes to local youth, by forging stronger relationships with local youth agencies. Art teaching programmes for our Coast's students have been extended with excellent uptake. Kim gave further details when she later presented her report to the AGM.

Our future planning thoughts

I explained that Estuary Arts was located in one of the fastest growing areas of the Super City and that this growth was forecast to continue on the Coast at a rapid rate over the years ahead. This growth would likely place great strain on our existing facilities without some creative and innovative growth-management strategies on the Board's part. One of the growth strategies the Board had decided upon, was the greater maximisation of our existing facilities. Specifically, this might be achieved by extending our opening hours and greater utilisation of our physical studio spaces.

Ensuring our future stability

At the moment, we receive annual grants from:

- The Hibiscus & Bays Local Board
- Foundation North
- Lotteries Grants Board
- St Lazarus Trust, Pub Charities, Lion Foundation, Creative Communities Scheme
- Local businesses' support

However we still suffer from long-term funding uncertainty. I said this situation was no way to run our organisation. The result of this funding uncertainty meant our hands were tied in achieving our long term goals. We needed to make the transition from the setting of our strategic planning goals (which we have now done) to the next and the most important phase of business-as-usual. I said that with Local Board voting papers out that day, I encouraged the Estuary Arts community to vote for the candidates who have promised to ensure that Council treats Estuary Arts in a fair way, such that it provides us with certainty of long term funding. Centre Manager Kim Boyd and her staff were all thanked by me, on behalf of the Board, for their sterling efforts throughout the year. As I did last year, I again referred to Kim as Estuary Arts' "Living Treasure."

Following conclusion of the AGM, we were treated to a captivating presentation by our Patron and award-winning artist, Gill Gatfield. She showed us slides of certain of her sculpture works, which have been displayed at different locations around the world, including Aarhus in Denmark, Venice in Italy and back home in Auckland, at the Wynyard Quarter's Silo Park.

We were all quite spellbound by the quality of her works, including the pieces "The Kiss," "Zealandia," and "Glass Ceiling." I would strongly encourage you to visit Gill's website www.gillgatfield.com to give you a taste of what we experienced at the AGM.

Following conclusion of the AGM, Robyn Tubb advised me that she was resigning from the Board.

Robyn leaves with the Board's best wishes for her future and thanks for her contribution to Estuary Arts while she was a Trustee. She now intends to pursue her arts and crafts interests and has an exciting overseas travel schedule planned for 2020.

The Board has identified a strong candidate to be co-opted onto the Board, to fill the vacancy left by Robyn. I shall give you further details in my next monthly report.

We plan to host this exhibition alongside Ian's book "A good Joke" in March 2020 and we are looking for collectors who would be interested in loaning some of Karl's work for this retrospective exhibition. I have the sad news to report that the Council had to fell the magnificent Melia tree which provided shade and a picturesque entrance to our arts centre. Council have informed me that the tree was felled because it had a large split down the main trunk and was dead inside, making it a

potential danger to the public and to the building. We are on the replacement planting list for 2020 which usually takes place in May / June. So it is a sad farewell to this gentle giant.

Many of our members have been inquiring about the outcome or public decision on the Orewa Moana Reserve water fountain sculpture replacement. In the Hibiscus Matters 4 Sept 2019 the preferred sculpture of choice was "Airbourne". A total of 180 people provided feedback on the five designs, which are all made of stainless



steel and created by artists Philipp Ripa of Wainui and John Mulholland of Warkworth. A total of 44 percent (79 votes) were for "Airbourne", and the next most popular was "Fleet", with 24 percent (43 votes).

Auckland Council staff are now working with the artists to ensure that "Airbourne" can be made sufficiently robust to be erected in a public space.



"The Bird is on the Wing" by Deborah Martin and Paul Mason Gallery Four

21 October to 17 November 2019

"The Bird is on the Wing" has been inspired by hours, weeks and months spent searching, sitting, observing and learning about the behaviour and habitat of NZ birds. Through photography and printmaking, Paul and Deborah strive to capture the personalities and stories from a wide range of NZ birds, many of which are beginning to thrive in predator free sanctuaries throughout NZ.

Deborah and Paul are based in Matakana Auckland. This is their first solo exhibition. They picked up photography together 4 years ago. About the same time, Deborah became a print maker. They have travelled around NZ ever since in search of subjects for inspirational bird photographs or prints. It may be a "coy" Sacred Kingfisher or an Australasian Gannet portrayed in an impressionist style. Whatever the creative process, the aim is for their images to stir up unexpected feelings and thoughts in the viewer.

Deborah and Paul's greatest teachers have been the birds themselves. Their hearts and minds have been transformed by NZ native birds. Around their home they have undertaken extensive native bush rejuvenation and a trapping programme to reduce the numbers of possums and rats which are a serious threat to NZ native birds. Last autumn they were rewarded when a Kaka fed daily from a totara next to their deck.
